

From outdoor adventures and icy treats to breezy alfresco dining spots, we've got 20 ChiCago great ways to beat the heat of summer in the Windy City

With winters as intense as Chicago's, it's no surprise that locals are all about soaking up the sun come summertime. And though it's hot outside, this city is full of ultra-cool things to eat, drink and do. Here are 20 of our favorites.

»Outdoor Eats

Spanish food lovers flock to Emilio's Sol y Nieve (215 E. Ohio St., 312-467-7177) in Streeterville for tasty traditional tapas—think bacon-wrapped dates and goat cheese with marinara-but the real summer treat is Emilio's massive sidewalk patio, with great people-watching just steps from the Mag Mile. Bubbly pitchers of peach, mango, raspberry and strawberry sangria (\$25) are the perfect accompaniment. In a more upscale mood? Snag a table in the intimate back garden at Old Town favorite Boka (1729 N. Halsted St., 312-337-6070), where executive chef Giuseppe Scurato whips up progressive American fare like trout with English pea puree and roasted fingerling potatoes. For a different perspective, head to River North's Rock Bottom Brewery (1 W. Grand Ave., 312-755-9339); sure, it's a chain, but the stellar rooftop beer garden offers one-of-a-kind skyline views.

»Breezy Cocktails

Nothing says summer quite like a frosty beverage-and we're not talking lemonade. One of our favorite libations, the Bomb Pop cocktail at Rockit Bar and Grill (22 W. Hubbard St., 312-645-6000) refreshes with a potent mix of Blue Curação, Bacardi Razz, and a mixture of Bacardi Limon and lemonade. At airy Latin hot spot Carnivale (702 W. Fulton Market, 312-850-5005), bartenders grind fresh mint for your raspberry mojito. Margarita lovers are in tequila heaven at Lalo's (500 N. LaSalle St., 312-329-0030), which serves up a potent Ultimate Margarita made with Sauza Tres Generaciones blue agave premium tequila, Cointreau, sour mix and a squirt of fresh lime. And Howl at the Moon (26 W. Hubbard St., 312-863-7427) is home to rowdy happy hours, nightly live piano music, and potent cocktails like a whopping 86-ounce Long Island Iced Tea, enough for you and several of your closest friends to share.

»Summer Soothers

Get a beach-inspired beauty treatment without leaving downtown with the Sea Spa Pedicure (\$65) at the Tiffani Kim Institute (310 W. Superior St., 312-260-9000). Designed for stressed-out or arthritic feet, the pedicure includes a whirlpool soak, sea salt scrub and seaweed mask to reduce joint inflammation and recondition the skin. Exotic fruit fans, take note: The Mango Body Buff and Polish (\$100) at Honey Child Salon and Spa (735 N. LaSalle St., 312-573-1300) is a full-body treatment done using a citrus scrub made with white sugarcane and citrus essential oils to reduce anxiety. And if you're mad about mango, good news: Honey Child also offers a mango mani-



cure (\$35) and pedicure (\$58). Get golden without any of the skin damage via the Fantasy Spray Tan (\$80) at Elizabeth Arden Salon and Spa (845 N. Michigan Ave., suite 908E, 312-944-4311), where an esthetician covers your body with a controlled spray that develops into a tan within four hours. At the nextday follow-up visit (which is covered in the cost), you can adjust to a darker shade. Results last about a week.

»Hot Nightspots

In search of some classic Chicago cool? Belly up to the bar at Jilly's (1007 N. Rush St., 312-664-1001), where slick bartenders shake up oversized martinis, a pianist warbles Rat Packera tunes, and patrons are treated to some of the best people-watching on Rush Street via outdoor tables and large open windows. For a more contemporary take on the retro experience, check into Motel (600 W. Chicago Ave., 312-822-2900), a bar so painstakingly decorated to resemble a swanky 1950s-'60s era hotel lobby bar that you'll think you've timetraveled back to a happy hour long ago. Sharply dressed patrons sip classic cocktails on the expansive outdoor patio or inside the bar's dark, comfy confines. Meanwhile, a relaxed hipster crowd congregates at Northside Tavern & Grill (1635 N. Damen Ave., 773-384-3555), whose sunny side patio is the perfect spot for burgers and a beer.

»Outdoor Adventures

Summer in Chicago is all about being outside and active, so rent a pair of rollerblades from Bike and Roll at the North Avenue Beach boathouse (1600 N. Lakeshore Dr., 773-327-2706) and cruise the path along Lake Michigan (\$8.75 per hour/\$34 per day). Or indulge your passion for putting at the Diversey Driving Range (141 W. Diversey Pkwy., 312-742-7929), not far from the Lincoln Park Zoo, where golf fans can hit a bucket of 100 balls for \$11.50 or play a game of mini golf (\$5.50 for kids, \$6.75 for adults). Kayak Chicago rents out kayaks at 1501 N. Magnolia St. (single kayaks \$15 per hour/\$60 per day, double kayaks \$25 per hour/\$100 per day, 630-336-7245). The company also offers an architectural tour of the Chicago River (F 5-8 pm, Su 3-6 pm; \$40). @
