### Eye Avoid It

Sunglasses are also sitting down this season, with the arms of the glasses attached at a lower point than past styles so that they sweep up more over the ear. It's not necessarily a comfort thing, but it does look cool.

Now that you know what's sassy in summer eyewear, here are some brief don'ts:

- · Perfectly round John Lennon shades are out, out, out, says Muller.
- · Ditto for sports wraps ("When you're not doing sports," she says).
- Colored lenses like the bright, punky pastels that Britney Spears

was a fan of last year are still cool, but they should have the funky silver gradient coating and/or be less vibrant. "They're more sophisticated, smokier," Muller says. "For example, not a bright pink, but a silvery-greyish pink."

Before you buy another pair of sunglasses, check out our quick guide—the type of face you have can make all the difference (and it's a lot easier to work on changing your sunglasses than reshaping your head).

#### IF YOUR FACE IS ..

Heart-shaped: Try aviator shades! The curves of the glasses are just the opposite of what the curves of your face are, giving you a balanced look.

Round: Stay away from round shapes, ovals or cat-eye frames!



Oval: Lucky you! This is the most universally easy-to-fit frame face. According to Muller, you can wear "pretty much anything."
